About the Mill

The mill, located in the village of Delta, Ontario, was built in 1810 by William Jones and Ira Schofield. Today it is one of the earliest surviving, fully automatic, grist mill in Canada and the only stone grist mill designated a National Historic Site of Canada.

In 1817 the mill was described as “*unquestionably the best building of its kind in Upper Canada.*” Today it has been restored to its former glory by the Delta Mill Society.

It served the community for 150 years, not only as a grist mill, but also as a sawmill. Milling ceased in the 1940s with the mill serving as a feed store until it finally closed its doors in 1960.

About Us


The Delta Mill Society is a non-profit organization run by an enthusiastic group of volunteers.

We are self-funded, relying on memberships, donations, gift shop sales, and proceeds from various fundraising activities. We also solicit government grants to help with specific projects.


The society dates back to 1963 when the last individual owner of the mill, Hastings Steele, deeded the mill, for the sum of \$1.00, to four trustees who in turn founded The Delta Mill Society.

Today we continue to work at maintaining this irreplaceable part of Ontario’s heritage and showcasing the milling technology of the 1800s.

Our Accomplishments

We’ve come a long way with the mill, examples include:

- 1999 - we initiated a huge restoration project of the mill and by 2004 it had been restored and stabilized so that it will last at least another 200 years.
- 2006 - we developed high quality interpretive displays to allow the public to better understand the mill and milling technology.
- 2010 - for the mill’s 200th anniversary we completed the operational restoration of the mill by installing working millstones, flour elevators and a bolter. The first stone ground flour in 100 years was produced that fall.

Our Commitment

- To provide visitors with an interesting and educational experience.
- To maintain the Old Stone Mill and keep it open to the public.
- To tell the story of the significant role grist mills played in the development of early Ontario.
- To work on the operation of the mill – grinding locally grown organic heritage wheat.
- To develop interpretation of the mill, of its original automatic mill design and operation through the years.
